ICS 100/700: Basic NIMS Training Workshop

This 8-hour course meets the requirements of the Basic Incident Command System. This course is designed to introduce the National Incident Management System (NIMS), the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS), and the Incident Command System (ICS) concepts. This instructor led course is intended to meet the basic level NIMS training requirements for county personnel. This course may also be completed online through the FEMA Independent Study program. Students will receive a FEMA Emergency Management Institute (EMI) certificate of completion after successfully passing the end of course exam.

Target Audience: Emergency response personnel, all government employees, disaster service workers, Amateur Radio Emergency Service Ham Radio operators, Search and Rescue Team members, volunteers, and generally anyone who may respond or be involved in coordinating and supporting incident management activities.

Prerequisite: None

ICS 300 - NIMS Compliant/All Risk-All Hazard Version INTERMEDIATE ICS

This 24-hour Intermediate Incident Command System (ICS) course was created for supervisory or management staff that would be assigned in a supervisory or leadership role in the Command or General Staff of an emergency response incident or major pre-planned event. (State Fire Marshal certification may be offered if enough local requests are received in advance of the course.)

This course meets NIMS/SEMS/ICS compliance and is a requirement to work in the Stanislaus Operational Area EOC.

Note: This is a 24-hour course and may be taken separately from ICS 400. If you want to take both classes, please register for each class.

Target Audience: Stanislaus County mid-level management including strike team leaders, task force leaders, unit leaders, division/group supervisors, branch directors and emergency operations center staff. Stanislaus County Command and General staff, select department heads with multi-agency coordination system responsibilities, area commanders, emergency managers and emergency operations center managers.

Prerequisite: Completion of: I 700 - Introduction to NIMS

ICS 100 - Introduction to ICS

ICS 200 - Basic ICS

ICS 400 - NIMS Compliant/All Risk-All Hazard Version ADVANCED ICS

This 16-hour Advanced Incident Command System (ICS) and Introduction to Emergency Operation Center (EOC) course was created for supervisory or management staff that would be assigned in a supervisory or leadership role in the Command or General Staff of an emergency response incident or major pre-planned event. (State Fire Marshal certification may be offered if enough local requests are received in advance of the course.) This course meets NIMS/SEMS/ICS compliance and is a requirement to work in the Stanislaus Operational Area EOC.

Note: This is a 16-hour course and may be taken separately from ICS 300. If you want to take both classes, please register for each class.

Target Audience: Stanislaus County mid-level management including strike team leaders, task force leaders, unit leaders, division/group supervisors, branch directors and emergency operations center staff. Stanislaus County Command and Ceneral staff, select department heads with multiagency coordination system responsibilities, area commanders, emergency managers and emergency operations center managers.

NIMS Executive Course (ICS 402)

This 2-hour course was designed for local elected officials, chief executives, and administrators. This course covers roles and responsibilities of the policy group, as well as the basics of the Incident Command System, an overview of the California Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS), and Introduction to the National Incident Management System (NIMS). The course also covers the Multi-Agency Coordination System (MACS) involving interactions with other jurisdictions/agencies to support the management or command of emergency incidents or major pre-planned events.

This specially designed course for Stanislaus County public/elected officials meets the requirements of IS700/Introduction to NIMS, ICS100/Introduction to ICS, and ICS402/Executive Course.

Target Audience: City Councils, Boards of Supervisors, Boards of Directors, Chief Executive Officers, Chief Administrative Officers, Department Directors, etc.

Prerequisite: None.

G626E: Essential EOC Action Planning

This 16-hour course focuses on the EOC organizational structure as it relates to EOC Action Planning. Each EOC Section (Mgt, Operations, Plans & Intel, Logistics, and Finance and Admin) will be discussed and illustrate each of the section's roles in the development of an EOC Action Plan. Components of the Planning "P" will be presented to include each step of the planning process.

Target Audience: Eligible participants include emergency management and response personnel who currently or potentially work in an EOC at the state, local, tribal or DoD installation level. Disciplines include, but are not limited to: Law Enforcement, Emergency Medical Services, Emergency Management, Fire Service, Governmental Administrative, Public Safety Communications, Healthcare, Public Health, Hazardous Materials, Public Works, and Non-Governmental Organizations.

Prerequisite: None.

EMC: Emergency Management Concepts – All-Hazards

This course introduces participants to key emergency management principles that will enhance their capabilities to work in a Local, Operational Area, Regional, or State Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Course content includes Essential EOC Section/Position training and a series of progressive table-top and functional exercises.

Topics include:

- Overview ICS/SEMS/NIMS
- EOC Management and Operations
- ICS/EOC Interface
- EOC Action Planning
- Section/Position Specific Training
- Table Top and Functional Exercises

This course satisfies the requirements of: G191 – ICS/EOC Interface Workshop, G611 – EOC Section/Position Specific Training, Planning, and G775 – EOC Management and Operations.

Target Audience: Eligible participants include emergency management and response personnel who currently or potentially work in an EOC at the state, local, tribal or DoD installation level. Disciplines include, but are not limited to: Law Enforcement, Emergency Medical Services, Emergency Management, Fire Service, Governmental Administrative, Public Safety Communications, Healthcare, Public Health, Hazardous Materials, Public Works, and Non-Governmental Organizations.

Prerequisite: None.

G-557: Rapid Assessment Workshop

This course focuses on plans and procedures for responding to the initial 4 hours of a disaster. Content includes pre-event planning, intelligence gathering, and situational awareness distribution.

A good rapid needs assessment within the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and Dept. Operations Center (DOC) will allow community leaders to prioritize response actions to have the greatest life saving and life sustaining benefits. As resources will be limited on the local level during the first few hours of a disaster or emergency event, the Rapid Needs Assessment should allow for the effective use of scarce resources to include prioritization of those resources. Likewise, it will allow local officials to request those resources that are not available locally and are needed to support life sustaining and life saving measures.

Target Audience: Eligible participants include emergency management and response personnel who currently or potentially work in an EOC at the state, local, tribal or DoD installation level. Disciplines include, but are not limited to: Law Enforcement, Emergency Medical Services, Emergency Management, Fire Service, Governmental Administrative, Public Safety Communications, Healthcare, Public Health, Hazardous Materials, Public Works, and Non-Governmental Organizations.

Prerequisite: None.

Intermediate Public Information Officer (IPIO)

This 24-hour course was designed to increase a PIOs ability to have strategic communications before, during and after an emergency. Using a "Whole Community" approach, this course walks participants step-by-step on how to write strategic incident communication plans which enables PIOs to immediately set the narrative immediately after an emergency. Participants will leave the course with the framework to create strategic incident communication plans for their own jurisdictions. This course creates a practical and strategic link between the Basic PIO course and the Advanced PIO course.

Target Audience: Eligible participants include emergency management and response personnel who currently or potentially work in an EOC at the state, local, tribal or DoD installation level. Disciplines include, but are not limited to: Law Enforcement, Emergency Medical Services, Emergency Management, Fire Service, Governmental Administrative, Public Safety Communications, Healthcare, Public Health, Hazardous Materials, Public Works, and Non-Governmental Organizations.

Topics Include:

- Whole Community
- Access and Functional Needs
- Recovery
- Strategic Communication Plans

Prerequisite: None.
